Andrew Hastings Logan was born on August 13, 1843, in Calcutta, West Bengal, India. He was the son of William Reallie Logan, an indigo planter from Scotland, and Isabella Hastings Dick. He and his sister Emma's early childhood was spent in India until the death of his mother from cholera in 1845 at the Dumcole Factory. Following this, he was sent to Scotland, where he lived in Prestwick with his grandfather, John Logan, and was educated at the Ayr Academy.

In 1856, at the age of twelve, Andrew and his sister Emma boarded the *Josephine Willis* as Chief Cabin passengers to join their father in Wairoa, Auckland, New Zealand. Their father had emigrated to the colony several years prior and was established there as a settler.

During the collision with the *Mangerton* on the night of February 3, 1856, Andrew was among those who reached the deck amidst the sinking of the vessel. Unlike his sister, who was assisted by George Andrew, and his friend Frederick Golding, who was seen with a small child, there are no specific surviving accounts of Andrew Logan's final moments on the ship or in the rigging. He was reported as drowned following the sinking of the ship off Folkestone.

While Andrew did not survive the disaster, his father, William Reallie Logan, continued to reside in New Zealand, where he remarried in 1857 and had two further children, Andrew's half-siblings. Andrew's father remained in the colony until his death in Otahuhu in 1891.
